The Environment Agency and British Waterways have agreed a new reciprocal licensing arrangement. It offers boaters who hold a private annual licence with one authority the opportunity to use the other's canals and rivers free, for up to 15 days a year. We want the arrangement to be as 'user friendly' as possible. However, all boaters need to observe the licensing conditions of any waterway they are using. This booklet provides information on how the agreement will work and gives advice to boaters cruising on rivers for the first time.



If you hold an Environment Agency private annual licence to use the River Thames, River Medway or Anglian Region rivers you can use British Waterways' canals and rivers free for up to 15 days in a year. The days need not be consecutive. All you need to do is make sure your Environment Agency licence is displayed. For further information about cruising on British Waterways' canals and rivers contact Customer Services. If you have never used British Waterways' canals and rivers before we advise you to contact us first.

British Waterways and the Manchester Ship Canal Company

If you hold a private annual licence to use the Bridgewater Canal you can travel free for up to 7 days in a year on these parts of the following British Waterways' canals.

Leeds & Liverpool Canal Leigh Branch, Wigan to Burscough and Wigan to the

bottom of Blackburn Locks

Trent & Mersey Canal Preston Brook to Harecastle Tunnel

Shropshire Union Canal Middlewich Branch from Middlewich to Barbridge Junction

Boaters need to make sure they display their Bridgewater Canal licence.

If you hold an annual licence to use the Bridgewater Canal you can also buy an annual licence to use British Waterways' canals and rivers at the normal price for a 3 month licence. If you hold a British Waterways annual licence you can use the Bridgewater Canal free for up to 7 days in a year. All you need to do is make sure your British Waterways licence is displayed.

If you hold a British Waterways private annual licence you can visit the River Thames free for up to 15 days in a year. Please remember when using the reciprocal licence to visit the Thames:

1 You are required to register your boat

You can register either on arrival, at any of the Thames entry point locks during staff hours or in advance from Thames Region, Craft Registration Department. When you have registered you will be given a free visitors licence plate which you must display in your boat.

You can only use your reciprocal licence to visit the River Thames for 15 consecutive days or individual days up to a maximum of six, free of charge.

The free 15 consecutive day visit can be extended by buying a further 15 day licence.

An extension of this visit is not available for those using the six individual days arrangement, because of legislation restrictions specific to the River Thames.

Using the locks

Stop your engines once your boat is moored in Thames locks. Turn off any radio, or other form of noise and pay careful attention to the lock keeper's instructions.

Connecting waterways

The Kennet and Avon Navigation – consisting of the River Kennet, Kennet and Avon Canal and the River Avon, it extends from the River Kennet in Reading to the Port of Bristol.

The Oxford Canal – gives access to the Midlands and the rest of the waterways system. **The Grand Union Canal** – can be entered from the tidal Thames at Brentford or Limehouse via the Regents Canal.

If you hold a British Waterways private annual licence you can visit Anglian Region's rivers, free for up to 15 days in a year. The days need not be consecutive.

As a visitor you need to fill in a form and maintain a log during your visit to assist us monitor the use of the reciprocal licence. Enclosed with the form and log, you will receive a visitor's licence disc which you should display. You can obtain the combined form and log on arrival, from agents on the Northampton Arm of the Grand Union Canal, or in advance from the Anglian Regional office.



If you are visiting the **River Nene** the majority of locks have steel pointing doors at the upstream end and vertical steel gates at the lower end. The vertical gates are normally locked and keys are therefore required. You can buy them, price £4, from the following agents on the Northampton Arm of the Grand Union Canal, the River Nene or in advance from the Anglian Regional office (allow two weeks).

If you are visiting the **River Great Ouse**, the majority of locks are unattended and can only be operated by the use of a windlass lock handle. These can be purchased from most marinas and chandlers.



Connecting waterways

River Nene - Grand Union Canal (Northampton Arm).

River Nene to the River Great Ouse and its accompanying system – it is possible to navigate from the River Nene to the River Great Ouse via the Middle Level Navigation.

River Cam – the Agency has an agreement with the Cam Conservators for the River Cam above Bottisham Lock, where the Cam Conservators recognise Agency boaters using mechanically powered boats.

All other navigations can be entered from their tidal reaches.



If you hold a British Waterways private annual licence you can visit the River Medway, free for up to 15 days in a year. The days need not be consecutive.

As a visitor you need to fill in a form and maintain a log during your visit to assist us monitor the use of the reciprocal licence. Enclosed with the form and log, you will receive a visitor's licence disc which you should display. You can obtain the combined form and log on arrival, at Allington Lock, or in advance from the Southern Regional office or Kent Area office.

Allington Lock which provides passage to and from the tidal section is open up to 3 hours before and 2 hours after high water. During the period 31st March to 31st October Agency staff will be available between 7.00am and sunset to operate the lock. For high tides outside these times Agency staff require 24 hours' notice of intended passage.



The nine locks above Allington are not manned. Lock handles to operate the winding shafts of the sluices can be purchased from local chandlers. The lock handle should have a square socket which fits properly on the spigots of the winding shafts which are 25.4mm (1in) square.


At Yalding there is a lifting bridge. This is operated by Agency staff on weekends and public bank holidays, during the boating season which extends from Easter until the end of September. You can operate the Yalding lifting bridge using a special key which can be purchased at Allington lock, price £4, or in advance from the Southern Regional office.

inter-regional arrangements

If you currently hold a private annual licence (powered and unpowered) for Thames, Anglian or Southern rivers you can apply for a free 15 consecutive day visitor's licence to visit each of the other Region's waterways. You can obtain your free licence on arrival, at entry point locks during staff hours or in Anglian Region, from agents on the Northampton Arm of the Grand Union Canal and the River Nene. Alternatively apply two weeks in advance to the relevant Regional Craft Registration Departments.

about using river

navigations

If you have not been on a river before, you need to read carefully the following information.

River currents

These will affect the handling of your boat and will increase and decrease according to flow conditions. They will also be strongest above and below weirs.

When approaching locks take note of directional signs and warnings of weirs. Take care when approaching a lock from upstream and keep over to the side of the river where the lock is positioned and keep well clear of the weir.

Warning boards (River Thames)


When large yellow CAUTION STREAM INCREASING/ DECREASING warning signs are displayed at locks, all unpowered boats are advised to moor up until the stream abates.

When INCREASING stream is indicated, powered boats are advised to seek safe mooring.

When DECREASING stream is indicated, powered boats may proceed with caution.

When large red CAUTION STRONG STREAM warning signs are displayed at locks, all boats are advised not to navigate until the stream abates.





Warning Systems (British Waterways)

There are two main types of flood warning systems in operation: Traffic lights operating red and green lights.

Red - it is dangerous to proceed beyond this point.

Green - it is safe to proceed.

Indicator boards (generally located on the lock wall) act as a gauge to measure the water level.

This gauge is marked off in different coloured bands:

Red - do not proceed beyond this point, the flood gates below are closed.

Amber - proceed with great care beyond this point.

Green - it is safe to proceed.

In addition to the above, there are local flood warning systems in operation. Contact the local British Waterways office for advice.

Mooring

Always moor with the front of your boat facing upstream (ie. against the current). If you are heading downstream, you need to overshoot the mooring, turn round and approach against the current. When stopping overnight, or leaving the boat for any appreciable time, do not moor in shallow water or with a tight rope or chain as water levels may fluctuate by as much as 2 or 3 feet in a few hours. If the level drops and a boat is beached or moored in shallow water, it may be damaged. If the level rises, and mooring ropes or chains are tight, the boat may take on water, be pulled under or even break free.
