## HOW FLOOD WARDENS CAN HELP THEIR LOCAL COMMUNITY DURING A FLOOD EVENT

During a flood event the authorities welcome the support they receive from the communities involved. Every community can do a great deal to help itself. One way of giving local support is by the use of the Flood Wardens.

Flood wardens are unpaid volunteers. They aim to help and protect others in their community as well as themselves. The wardens know their local area and the people who live there and act as a contact between the Environment Agency and their neighbours. They pass on flood warnings, flood information, literature and are enthusiastic about helping to protect their neighbours and their community.

The wardens can help promote awareness of flood risk in their local community, encourage their neighbours to make preparations for flood events and can offer help to vulnerable neighbours, as long as this can be carried out without creating further risk to the wardens or their families.

### THE FLOOD WARDEN'S ROLE

Wardens act as a contact between their neighbours and the Environment Agency. They decide which properties they will notify in the event of the Agency issuing a flood warning.

The maximum recommended number of properties for a flood warden group is ten. However if the properties are spread out over a large area the Agency would then suggest a maximum of five properties. It is important that wardens have time to protect their own properties as well as warning others.

Flood wardens will not be expected to have specialist expertise. They should be good communicators, reasonably fit and living in or close to a flood risk area.

### **SUGGESTED ACTIONS**

Each individual warden should decide what will work best for them and their neighbours. However, the Agency does have a few suggestions:

### \* Register with the AVM

The Agency has a free Automated Voice Messaging (AVM) System which issues flood warnings by phone and fax. You may already be on the system if you have received this handbook however we would suggest you ring the Agency's Floodline on 0845 988 1188 to check that you are on the System or to ask to be registered as a flood warden if necessary.

\* Prepare a flood kit

A flood kit should consist of essential items to ensure you have them easily to hand in the event of flooding. Suggested contents should include:

- \* Warm & waterproof clothing
- \* Wellington boots
- \* Torch
- \* Battery or wind up radio
- \* First Aid kit
- \* Blankets
- \* Necessary medication
- \* Rubber Gloves

Know where you can turn off electricity, gas and water in your own home. If your own home is at risk from flooding you should do this before helping others.

### \* Promote flood risk awareness in your neighbourhood

Let your neighbours know about the Flood Warning Service and seek agreement with them for you to act as their flood warden. Tell them about the Floodline number 0845 988 1188 and ask them to keep it next to their phone.

Encourage your neighbours to keep in a safe place a copy of the Environment Agency's Flood Directory. This gives essential advice on home flood plans, flood kits, staying safe and clearing up after a flood. Copies of this directory are available free from the Agency's Flood Warning Team at the Kent Area Office telephone: 01732 223256 or from Floodline on 0845 988 1188

Know how and where to contact your neighbours during a flood event. Draw up a list of home and work contact phone numbers from those you have agreed to notify.

Keep in a safe place a list of useful telephone numbers of the local authorities and any other organisations that may be able to help during an emergency (a list of suggestions can be found on pages 9 & 10)

Keep a list of vulnerable members of the community such as the elderly or the disabled who may need special help during an emergency.

Note any special resources in your area that may help during a flood event for example neighbours with special skills or equipment.

## \* Draw up a contingency plan for flooding in your neighbourhood.

Learn about the likely effects of flooding in your neighbourhood.

Consider designing a flood event action plan for your neighbourhood.

Think about establishing a local store for sandbags and other useful equipment. Your local district or borough council can give you advice about sandbags and the creation of a local sandbag store.

### **IMPORTANT**

- \* Know your limitations. Do not put yourself at risk
- \* Keep calm and reassure others.
- \* Always follow the directions of the Police and other emergency services.



## THE ENVIRONMENT AGENCY'S FLOOD CODES

The Environment Agency operates a flood warning service in areas at risk of flood from rivers or the sea. Agency staff monitor the weather, river and sea levels 24 hours a day. This information is used to forecast the possibility of flooding using a national coding system, as set out below.

Suggested actions for Flood Wardens to consider are indicated beside each code.

### **HEALTH & SAFETY FOR FLOOD WARDENS**

#### POTENTIAL HAZARDS IN FLOODS

- \* Fast moving flood water
- \* Unseen hazards beneath flood water (e.g manhole covers)
- \* Polluted water
- \* Weakened walls, river banks or bridges
- \* Moving heavy objects
- \* Slippery mud and sediment
- \* Electricity and gas supplies

### **HEALTH AND SAFETY ADVICE**

- \* Don't try to walk or drive through flood water
- \* Be aware of unseen hazards
- \* Avoid contacts with flood water
- \* Wear protective clothing
- \* Sturdy boots
- \* Waterproof gloves
- \* Keep your hands away from your face whilst cleaning and always wash your hands if you make contact with flood water or silt
- \* Keep away from riverbanks during floods
- \* Do not attempt to move heavy objects, particularly those that are unstable.
- \* Always move slowly and carefully through any mud or standing water left after floods
- \* Switch off gas and electricity supplies at the first sign of flooding.
